Montréal-based singer and composer Ayelet Rose Gottlieb brings a wide array of influences to this set, sung in English, Hebrew, Ladino, Yiddish, Arabic, French, Spanish and Farsi. There's a dark and mysterious atmosphere, a bit of a Portishead vibe, thanks to Bernard Falaise's otherworldly blend of guitars, keyboards and electronics. Hamin Honari, on Persian hand percussion, mixes it up with bassist Stéphane Diamantakiou to complete the Dream Keepers lineup.

Like her fellow members of the John Zorn-founded a cappella quartet Mycale (Sofia Rei, Malika Zarra, Sara Serpa), Gottlieb is a fluent improviser, rhythmically adept, drawn to music of the world, mining from poetry and other lyrical sources. She has six original pieces on *DUST*, along with three by Falaise and two by Diamantakiou. The music is ceaselessly melodic, with details and intricacies that never obscure the music's inner warmth or interrupt the music's unhurried flow. The booklet, too, is beautiful: Sarit Evrani's 12 color illustrations represent letters that spell out "Dream Keeper," accompanied by lyrics (in English translation) for each of the tracks.

Dream Keepers: Dust





Ayelet Rose Gottlieb believes in the transformative power of art

All of the musicians in **Dream Keepers** are Canadian, an often volcanic [albeit in the most positively fascinating manner] society that is a melting pot of cultures. The Québécois guitarist Bernard Falaise, percussionist Hamin Honari and contrabassist Stéphane Diamantakiou share a deep and abiding musical bond with the vocalist and notional leader of the ensemble, vocalist **Ayelet Rose Gottlieb**. In many ways Ms Rose Gottlieb is the quintessence of the group, a 'place where East and West meet,' which is as good a categorisation as any. This is what makes *Dust* so incredibly special.



Ms Rose Gottlieb is one of the leading composers and vocalists who brings together her unique mixed European, Middle-Eastern [and] Jewish background, and the influence of Eastern philosophies is eminently clear in many of her attitudes towards spirituality and its expression – whether writing music and lyrics and vocalising them or in interpreting the music and lyrics of a world of writers and poets [as she often demonstrates]. In the music of *Dust*, she tends to explore a wide range of sonorities – nudging the other performers to dig deep into their own multicultural backgrounds and do likewise.

The result is the creation of music – from *The Dream Keeper*, *Amal zo Tikva* and *Beads*, through *Three Kisses*, *Azoy vi mayn blik der fartrerter*, *Demain dès l'aube*, and, of course, *Dust* – that is extraordinarily still and serene, leaving the listener with a sense of timelessness rare in Western music. Deep listening [like that propositioned by Pauline Oliveros] will reveal to those who keep still and listen with their hearts the most original flourishes. Ecstatic soft rolling thunder of large Persian hand-drums over strange scurrying harmonies from the wailing – sometimes dissonant – strings of the guitar, all of this woven into the dark rumbling of the contrabass.

Above all is the voice, which breaks through the static tonal [or atonal, as the song demands] calm in the voice rising and falling in chromatic episodes. Each composed and improvised sequence is driven by equal parts logic and emotion, in scores that are filled with – by turn – pulsating agitation, calm beauty and resolution. All the performers shine, bringing outstanding, interiorised and idiomatic interpretations of these – most mysterious – intricate musical canvases created from the poetry of some of the greatest wordsmiths of our time.

The stock of each of these artists rises considerably with their respective performances – both individual and ensemble. And yet one gets a sense that if there is one common denominator here it is [further proof that in] Ms Rose Gottlieb's vocalastics is her belief in the transformative power of art. Most of her uniqueness as a vocalist lies in the ability to unite this group with her imagery [both secular and spiritual] as she shares her passionate belief in the ability of music to establish a sense of connection with the transcendent. And every performer on Dust responds likewise.

The opening song in Israeli-Canadian jazz vocalist-songwriter Ayelet Rose Gottlieb's new album *Dust* matches the poem «The Dream Keeper» of American poet Langston Hughes (which also inspired Charlie Haden and The Liberation Music Orchestra's album by the same name, Blue Note, 1990) with the poem «Tfila» (prayer in Hebrew) by the Israeli poet Erez Bitton. This is the story of *Dust*. A compassionate and poetic attempt to

respond to the current, most challenging and unfathomable times that are «Awya from the toorough fingers / Of the world» (as Hughes wrote), and to ask questions of complex identity, home and exile, and keep the dream alive. *Dust* is titled after a poem of American poet Dorianne Laux, as dust leaves a faint flavour in our mouths; it's the dust of our physical existence, but also the stardust of our dreaming selves, reminding us that we are all interwoven.

The Jerusalem-born, Montréal-based Gottlieb is known from the vocal ensemble Mycale, and her collaborations with the string quartet ETHEL and Palestinian-American poet Naomi Shihab Nye. She has always opted for an inclusive musical vision that accommodates elements of jazz, artrock, traditional Jewish music, and Middle Eastern music. She sings in English, French, and her ancestral languages – Hebrew, Ladino, Yiddish and Arabic, and is accompanied by the Dream Keepers – Iranian-Candian percussionist Hamin Honari, who also sings in Farsi, Canadian guitarist-keyboard player Bernard Falaise and French double bass player Stéphane Diamantakiou.

The twelve songs suggest a much better, brave new world, where machoistic, reptilian forces are pushed back in favor of feminine, sensual ideas, «the powerful voices of ten thousand grandmothers, and the tender silences between our walls». Dust can be listened - and experienced as a sonic haven for dreaming and grieving, but Gottlieb is not an innocent believer who imagines «there's no countries». She is a sober believer in the transformative, liberating power of music and poetry, who knows how to articulate a thoughtful, convincing, and tangible vision. Just listen to her warm, wise delivery of the poem of Puerto Rican poetess Aurora Levins Morales that wrote: «...There are no leaders who dare to say / every life is precious, so it will have to be us...» She uses the poem «Amal zo tikva» by Israeli poet Almog Behar to establish a strong link between the Hebrew and Arabic cultures, with quotes of Egyptian great singer Oum Kulthum's masterpiece «Amal Hayaty». She uses the poem of American Yiddish poetess Anna Margolin who believed in the comforting, healing power of love: «But listen, oh, like so, until late / for the coming of the shadow of love, / sad as river grasses, / tender as the names of the flowers», and «By Night» by Chilean Pablo Neruda, with a similar message: «...That's why, love, tie me to pure movement, / to the tenacity that beats in your breast / with the wings of a submerged swan...». This cycle of prayers, pleas, and dreams ends with Dylan Thomas' «One voice of all»: «...One voice of all he remembers most dearly / as his dream buckets down».
